**BROOMY** township was constituted by an order of the  
Poor Law Board, dated 23rd November, 1868; and by a subse-  
quent order dated 12th February, 1869, was added to the  
Ringwood union, and is in the county court district of Ford-  
ingbridge. It is composed of places which were extra-

**BROUGHTON** is a pleasant village  $3\frac{1}{2}$  miles north-west  
from Horsebridge station on the Andover and Redbridge  
branch of the London and South Western railway, 4 south-  
west from Stockbridge and 13 north-west from Romsey, in  
the Northern division of the county, hundred of Thorngate,  
Romsey petty sessional division and county court district,  
Stockbridge union, diocese and archdeaconry of Winchester  
and rural deanery of Romsey. The church of St. Mary is  
an ancient structure, and has chancel, nave, aisles, north  
and south porches, with massive low square embattled tower  
containing 5 bells and a clock: it was reseat in 1853. The  
register dates from the year 1665. The living is a rectory,  
with the rectory of Bossington annexed, joint yearly value  
£917, with residence and 32 acres of glebe, in the gift of  
William Baring esq. and held by the Rev. Stanlake Lee M.A.  
of Queen's College, Oxford. There are chapels for Baptists  
and Wesleyans. A fair is held on the first Monday in July.  
Broughton House, the residence of James George Edwards  
esq. is pleasantly situated at the south of the village, as is  
also the Rookery, the residence of Philip Keele Emmott  
esq. Henry Smith's charity, of £26 17s. yearly, is for  
clothing, and other charities of £16 yearly, are distributed  
by the rector and churchwardens, and £20, which was left by  
the late T. Baring esq. is distributed by the rector alone.  
William Baring esq. J.P. who is lord of the manor, J. H.  
Brewer esq. and Sir William Heathcote bart. are the principal  
landowners. The soil and subsoil are chalk. The chief  
crops are wheat, barley and oats. The area is 4,171 acres;  
rateable value, £6,202; the population in 1871 was 959.

**CROWN FARM** and **FRENCHMOOR**, formerly extra-  
parochial, are parishes, the former being in the occupation of  
Mr. James W. Teasdale, of Bossington, with an area of 167  
acres; rateable value, £163; and had in 1871 a population
