

The ground is of alluvial peaty soils, gravels and clays in the valley floor which quickly give way to a thin covering of flinty topsoil over chalk on the higher ground. The village is in a conservation area, and borders the Broughton Down Nature Reserve.


OTHER ATTRACTIONS TODAY

FLOWER SHOW and MILLENNIUM BANNERS

The 12th century St Mary's Church hosts a wonderful floral display. Also on show are the much celebrated Millennium Banners printed on silk by our village organisations to commemorate the turn of the century.

MILLENNIUM ART and ART STUDIOS

The works of art commemorating the Millennium are individual pieces of sculpture hewn out of Killarney limestone, freestone and oak and strategically placed around the village for all to enjoy.



DOVECOTE and WELL HOUSE

Broughton is proud to have one of the few remaining dovecots in the country complete with its restored working potence and it is open to visitors today courtesy of St Mary's Church.

See also our recently restored Wellhouse, originally built in the drought of 1921 and now refurbished complete with floodlighting to the deep well.
